What Do We Do?

The Treasurer is a constitutional officer elected by the people for a four year term. The Treasurer provides independence from the Board of County Commissioners (the legislative branch) as well as all other various local governments that have the ability to levy taxes and assessments. This provides separation from the branch of government responsible for levying taxes to the branch charged with collecting tax revenues.

How are We Set Up?

The County Treasurer's office is charged with the collection of various taxes along with acting as the "bank" for the county, school districts, fire districts, water districts, and other entities of local government. Tax adjustments authorized by the Assessor's office or courts are also processed and refunds are issued to the appropriate tax-payers. Excess monies not currently being used by the county or various local governments are "pooled" for investment with the emphasis of ensuring public monies are safe and secure, available when needed, and achieve the best rate of return after meeting the first two objectives.

Accomplishments

Fiscal Year 2021

Despite combating the global pandemic for most of the year, transparency and serving our tax payers and districts remained our priority.

Foreclosures and Distraint

Each year, the Benton County Treasurer's Office is notified of properties and business equipment that has become delinquent and is included in the fore-closure and distraint process for the current year. During the 2021 year, we started with 254 foreclosure and 524 distraint parcels. We worked diligently with the taxpayers and ended 2021 with only 1 fore-closure and 0 distraint parcels that went to sale. We strive to make our taxing districts whole and keep people in their homes.

Investments

We serve as the investment office for many local governments in addition to Benton County. Even in the unstable economy with lower interest rates, the investment pool has been exceeding expectations for all participating entities. Total investments for 2021 were \$396,500,327.14.

Statements Sent

Tax statements are required by law to be sent annually on or before March 15th. In 2021, we sent the statements the first week of March to give taxpayers a substantial amount of time to pay.

2022 Goals

New Administration Building

We have moved to our new Administration Building which currently houses three departments; Benton County Assessor, Auditor and Treasurer. Our goal is to provide excellent service to our community by working cohesively with all three departments. While we have implemented some new processes, we are always looking for new ways to better serve the citizens of Benton County.

New Legislation

A new bill has recently passed affecting how interest and penalty are assessed to certain residential and personal properties. We are closely working with all other counties, along with our software vendor, to find a transparent and reliable implementation process.

Mobile Home Distraint Process

Recent legislature changed the requirements for the distraint process on mobile homes. 2022 will be the first year implementing these changes and we are working with our districts and taxpayers to help keep them in their homes.

Revenue and Expenses

The Assessor identifies and determines the value of all taxable real and personal property, along with the levy rates, which are used to calculate the property tax amount due for each parcel. The Treasurer then issues statements informing the taxpayers what amount is to be collected for the year. Property taxes are collected by the Treasurer's Office and distributed to the corresponding county and district funds. Below you will find the distribution of property taxes once they are collected.

Property taxes are the largest revenue source for the county. 

Sales and use taxes are the second largest revenue source for Benton County, second only to real & personal property taxes. The Treasurer's Office monitors and analyzes local retail sales & use tax trends; we receive data from the Department of Revenue on a monthly basis. Analyzing this data helps our office be more accurate when forecasting future revenue.

The pie chart on the left displays the breakdown of the collected sales and use tax for the 2021 tax year. The total collected for 2021 was \$15,599,399.16, an increase from 2020. We anticipate this to trend higher as more purchases are made online.
